Basic Watercolor Supplies

I. Watercolor paper:

I recommend Arches Cold press, 140# or higher, as you will be happiest with your painting on that weight and type paper. You can get a watercolor "block" which has 20 sheets in a pack and is the easiest to bring to a class. The blocks come in different sizes...please do not get anything smaller than 12" x 16". There are also full-sized single sheets, but they are much larger ...22" x 30".

- 2. <u>Gatorboard</u> or some lightweight waterproof board if you buy single sheets of paper as you will need to tape your paper on a firm surface other than the table top.
- 3. <u>Brushes</u>: <u>Rounds</u>: #6 and #10 at least; make sure they have a good point. Flats: ½" and 1"

4. Watercolor paint:

For beginners: Two yellows: New Gamboge and Winsor Lemon

Two blues: Ultramarine Blue and Cobalt Blue

Two Reds: Alizarin Crimson, permanent, and

Quinacridone Rose

Two Earths: Quinacridone Gold, Burnt Sienna

Winsor Newton, Daniel Smith, Schmincke, and probably Blick's are good brands, but get professional-grade paint, NOT student-grade paint.

For non-beginners....bring whatever you have.....

- 5. Paint palette Get something big enough to mix paint on!
- 6. Non permanent tinted Masking Fluid (I use Winsor Newton)
- 7. Masking Fluid remover square
- 8. Kneaded eraser
- 9. <u>#2H pencil</u> (or light gray watercolor pencil if you do not like visible pencil strokes.)
- 10. 1" artist's tape

Again, this is a basic starting supply list. More items may be added as the class progresses....
