Printmaking - Beginning Etching

Class Description:

Etching, or more accurately, *Intaglio*, is a versatile art form that allows the artist to design images that are painterly or precise. It involves incising a drawing or design into a copper plate using tools and etchants, and printing onto paper using a press. Gain the foundational skills of drypoint, line etching, and aquatint printing while learning the history and current practices of this globally popular art form. Best practices in safer and less toxic material use and options are used in this class. *Price includes a \$45 studio and materials fee which covers all basic supplies. Students may bring supplemental materials to class.*

Supplemental Materials for Beginning Etching:

- notebook/folder/sketchbook (your preference for ideas, demo notes)
- pen, pencil, eraser for note taking and sketching ideas
- 22" x 30" Printmaking Paper, MAC and your studio materials fee gets you started with 2 sheets of Domestic Etching Paper (one of the most exciting things about this class will be paper experimentation, we will look at choices in class and buy paper as the class progresses. Some good choices, Fabriano Printmaking Paper, Magnani, Somerset, Hahnemule, Murrillo (white or cream), Stonehenge (white or cream), BFK Rives, and Domestic Etching Paper is good for proofing.
- etching needle
- etching scraper
- etching burnisher
- solvent gloves, Nitrile blue-green type, buy them large enough to slide off and on easy, we use them for clean up. (Hardware store or Home Depot). Some students buy a box of disposable nitrile gloves, and MAC has heavy duty solvent gloves in the studio to use with the etching bath.
- brown jersey gloves cotton gardening type, buy them so they fit your hand tight not floppy (Fred Meyer garden section sells them or other garden stores) bring them if you have them, if not MAC has some in the studio.
- aquarellable pencil (waterbase writes on glass, metal, plastic comes in yellow, red, blue, etc.)
- Box or art tackle box for carrying supplies
- portfolio hinged cardboard is fine for transportation of paper and prints, a little bigger than your print paper gets it into the studio safe for ripping down to size -24" x 32" would be good.

Optional Materials: MAC has some of these items for shared use in the studio. Put them in your art box if you have them.

- repositionable masking tape (low adhesive blue tape)
- scissors and x--acto knife
- ceramics trim tool (needle type with wood handle)
- apron or smock
- white china marker pencil (grease pencil)
- MAC has a couple sets of etching needle, scraper and burnisher for in-class use only.

The Trayle Print Studio has etching copper plates that you can purchase for the class from MAC, bring in your existing plates and purchase more in-class, as you need it.

Your studio material fee covers:

2 sheets of white Stonehenge and Domestic Etching printmaking paper, etching grounds, ferric chloride acid, solvents, oil-based printmaking inks, tarlatan, cheesecloth, rags and plate cleaning supplies, newsprint, blotters, brayers, ink knives, wheat paste for chine collé, printing presses.
